The United Nations Education, Science and Culture Organization International Bioethics Committee:

Reminding the Nuremberg code of 1947, and the Universal Declaration on Bioethics and Human Rights of UNESCO in 2005 that establishes the main ethical principles and concerns of human gene experimentation,

Regarding the Agreement on the Application of Sanitary and Phytosanitary Measures of 1995 and the Conference of Parties, that sets the standards to preserve biodiversity and to defend human and animal life in global trading,

Acknowledging the actual conflicting clone ethics between nations and the objectives of the 2030 agenda,

1. Approves animal cloning for the research of medical treatments and pharmaceutical products taking into account the rights and protection of the species, as well as common law;
2. Encourages the commercialization of cloned-based products, under the condition that these products are properly labelled and differentiated from non-based cloned animal products, encouraging the long-term of investigation of the side effects of these products;
3. Accepts to prioritize the conservation of endangered species;

4. Authorizes the usage of animal cloning only if extreme environmental situations are reached around the globe creating a genetic bank which will help in the preservation of the genetic material, and which will be evaluated by an international scientific institution in order to determine the future of these species;
5. Approves the revival of extinct species only if extinction would cause critical damage to the local environment and biodiversity, the cases will be approved one by one by an international scientific institution which will evaluate either the impact for the ecosystem and time lasted since its extinction;
6. Encourages the academic support to undeveloped countries in the matters of animal cloning, economic support will not be mandatory, and if done it will be regulated by an international committee which will assure the safety of activities performed with this capital.
